We're so proud to announce that our very talented Head of Art, Ms Westwood, has a new solo show at The Burton Art Gallery in Bideford, Devon. The exhibition will run from 17th June - 19th September 2023 consisting of a re-imagined collection of historical artefacts.

The exhibition features a collection of carefully crafted vessels, vases, bowls and coins that make direct reference to the female experience, and in particular to the physical, social, professional and domestic injustices encountered on a daily basis. At first glance, none of these objects would look out of place in a traditional museum cabinet, and yet a

closer look reveals a very different story. The stories they tell cast light on the real and often disconcerting position that women have in contemporary society.

Ms Westwood is a conceptual artist and ceramicist whose work was chosen to appear on Perry's Grayson critically acclaimed Art Club on Channel 4 in April 2022. Later that year her work was exhibited in a major national exhibition at MAC (Midlands Art Centre) alongside other artists. members of the general public, comedians and popular figures who featured in the third series Art Club.

















Ethan receives prestigious award for creative military competition



Ethan and his parents were invited to London on Tuesday 20th June to recite his winning poem to a distinguished group of guests at the Main Building of the Ministry of Defence. After the presentation, a reception was held where Ethan and his family had the opportunity to meet with the guests and receive congratulations for his excellent work.

Ethan and the other winners were presented with a special goodie bag and a personalised certificate of participation. Ethan also

received a Headteacher's Award from Mr Scott before the event.

Teesside University STEM Challenge Day



On Tuesday 4th July, a group of ten pupils from Years 8 and 9 participated in a Science and Technology Challenge Day at Teesside University. The pupils engaged in three out of four activities designed to provide them with a practical understanding of how STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths) is applied in real-life situations.

- 1. Police forensic insight: Pupils were able to see how observations help the police, and were given access to e-photofit software to allow them to produce photofit images.
- 2. Robot programming: Allowing a Lego car to work its way around a series of obstacles using its colour sensors and proximity sensors after being programmed.
- 3. Car design: Using mechanisms and motion to build the fastest vehicle along a short course.
- 4. Medical diagnosis: Being shown by medical students how to ask the right questions, and look at medical history to be able to diagnose a patient.

During the day, the pupils collaborated with students from another school to form small teams and compete for a chance to advance to a nationwide final.




Our adventure commenced in the Lidl car park. It was there that we had the privilege of being joined by Col. John from The Station in Richmond, who astounded us with the original blueprints for the Catterick Camp Railway – an absolute marvel.

From there, we embarked on a walk towards where the Walkerville Crossing once stood, accompanied by Bill, whose extensive knowledge left us in awe. Following our newly created heritage map, we headed back towards Lidl, delving deeper into the history of the Lidl site, particularly the former Hotel Walkerville

that once stood there. Along the heritage trail, our knowledgeable Veterans provided insightful commentary as we made our way towards Colburn, we observed signs of the former railway line along the way. We eventually reached the location that was once home to 60 Squadron, a big thank you to Knile for enriching understanding our with his knowledge.



The old railway line led us to a crossroads known locally as the White Shops, where we met Paula, who told us about the history of the area.



Thank you to Paula for her vast knowledge, the students expressed their heartfelt appreciation to Paula for her extensive knowledge and learned about the surrounding area of the junction and the wider vicinity, which is steeped in rich heritage and history. We want to thank Paula for her knowledge; the kids learned about the surrounding region of the junction and the wider vicinity, which is rich in tradition and history.

Our heritage route map contained both current photos and images of what used to be there, making it an excellent visual aid for navigation and learning. We continued in an easterly direction toward Camp Centre.

We arrived at Piave Lines after being picked up by our community minibus and had lunch at The Centenary Hub. This structure is steeped in history, with portraits and pictures dating back decades, making it an appropriate setting to relax and enjoy our lunch.

Following lunch, we travelled to Shildon to meet with Senior Explainer, Anne Hopps, and her crew at the Locomotion Railway Museum. What a fantastic experience for everyone, Anne gave a brilliant



presentation about the Catterick Camp Railway. After receiving briefings from her staff, we were given a guided tour of the museum, and after a little stroll, we came upon engineers laying a new line.

KS3 Careers Overview

During Tutor Time, KS3 pupils completed careers-related tasks for their personal development and had access to further careers information, advice and guidance during their dedicated lessons within the Social Studies programme. establishments, locally and nationally, that supported our Year 10 pupils with their Work Experience placements. At Risedale we see Work Experience as a crucial part of a young person's development. For many of them it's the first time they have experienced life beyond the school gates and had the opportunity to be independent and responsible young adults in society as well as honing their employability and transferable skills.

In June, Year 10 attended Taster Days at Darlington College and Queen Elizabeth Sixth Form College, in preparation for them making informed choices about their college applications. This process will continue in Year 11.

Army Work Experience

On Monday 10th July 2023, a group of Year 10 pupils travelled from Risedale to Otterburn Training Camp in Northumberland for a four-day work experience with the Armed Forces. The Outreach Team based at Marne Barracks in Catterick delivered the course.

As soon as the pupils stepped off the minibus they were immediately treated as if they were new recruits in the Army and were expected to follow all instructions with military precision and due diligence. They marched to their classroom and received their first briefing, informing them about course expectations and conduct guidelines followed by a delicious lunch in the cookhouse.





The pupils received classroom-based lessons including learning the six-section battle drills and practical lessons in the field where they could put their newfound knowledge into action. They learnt how to create shelters using ponchos and took part in section attacks in some pretty gruelling weather conditions. They cooked meals for themselves using traditional Army ration packs, wore combat uniforms, including helmets with scrim and applied camo cream to their faces. They also received medical training, which taught them vital battlefield and everyday life skills.

The pupils had to work in sections, where they were mixed with another school as a team to overcome and adapt to the different scenarios and obstacles they were presented with. As a result of their team-building experience, the pupils developed many life skills likely to benefit them in the future regardless of whether they choose to pursue a military or civilian career.

Isabelle Young (10 Brierley) was not initially sure about a career in the military but reflected by saying, "The course has been really good. It has taught me a lot about the medical side of the military. It was a great experience, everyone was very supportive and we all had a laugh too."

The pupils also had the opportunity to participate in a Q&A session with recruits who attend the Army Foundation College in Harrogate. The session provided a real insight into life after school for those heading for a career in the Army.

Katie Hill (10 Higham) had already shown an interest in the forces and said, "I think it was a really good experience. I liked how we were able to talk to the recruits from Harrogate because I was able to ask them



lots of questions and I am now a lot more confident about what I want to do."

Lewis Littler (10 Southworth-Gedye) said, "It was a really good course. I already knew I wanted to go to Harrogate, but being able to ask questions and find more information has made me want to do it even more."

Oliver Cooke (10 Higham) said, "After taking part in the Army Work Experience programme I know now that I would definitely like to pursue a career in the Army."

Risedale Administrator Miss Hardstaff said, "Despite the course being both mentally and physically challenging the pupils excelled and put their all into everything that was thrown at them."

"The reality of being away from home and school was something that all our young people found challenging but they proved that they were more than capable of conducting themselves in a positive manner which they should be extremely proud of."

"The feedback I have received from the instructors was outstanding! I am delighted that all the pupils enjoyed the course and I am hopeful that we will be able to work in partnership with the military again to support further opportunities like this in the future."

Thank you once again to the Outreach Team in Catterick for delivering such a brilliant

experience and huge congratulations to the pupils for successfully completing the course.


