To help us support our pupils further, having an accredited practitioner has been invaluable in the identification and guidance of how we can further support those pupils who require an additional helping hand and also to provide our own staff with training on what they can do too! We have some exciting developments in this area and training coming up. We will be in touch again as things move forward.

Risedale pupils attend the opening of Catterick Historical Archive



Three pupils from Risedale had the privilege of attending the opening of the Veterans iHub's 'Catterick Historical Archive' at the Beacon on Thursday 7th September. The archive

was officially opened by Carl Les, Leader of North Yorkshire Council and a Governor at Risedale School.

The Catterick Historical Archive is a treasure trove of artefacts that have been unearthed during historical excavations in Catterick, providing valuable insights into the Roman era in the region. Additionally, it houses various items that shed light on more recent developments such as the railway, army camp, and wartime Catterick. This unique opportunity allows our pupils to engage with genuine historical artefacts and documents, enriching their understanding of the area's rich history.

Michael Houlgate, Head of History at Risedale, and the Humanities staff began collaborating with the Veterans Association towards the end of the last academic year where our #RisedaleExplorers enjoyed their first heritage walk led by Mark Hill MBE.. We hope that this partnership will continue to grow and provide even more opportunities for our pupils to connect with the rich history of their community.

Teacher of PE, Mr Pugh, said, "As part Cambridae of the National qualification, our pupils had to plan for and be able to demonstrate knowledge and skills during an outdoor adventurous activity. There were numerous suggested activities in which the pupils could take part such as camping, orienteering and trail cycling, however, myself and Mr Lawson both wanted to give pupils a new exciting experience and decided to make it one to remember... and it certainly was that".

Paris 2023 - by Mr Miller, Head of MFL

"*Bienvenue à Paris!*" In September, 40 Risedale pupils spent a week in Paris, as part of their GCSE French studies. And it was "*absolument fabuleux*!"



We travelled with the UK's leading school travel company, PGL, and stayed at their flagship property on the outskirts of the French capital, Château de Grande Romaine (CdGR) – a former five-star hotel where the Brazil men's national football team stayed during the 1998 World Cup. We had a full itinerary, soaking up French culture, visiting world-famous sites, practising French speaking skills...and having loads of fun too!

The first day was spent travelling, including a very blowy ferry crossing across the Channel (interesting fact: the French don't translate 'The English Channel' – instead, they call it "*La Manche*", which translates as 'The Sleeve'!). We arrived at our base at tea time and were introduced to our PGL rep, Alex. We had a tour of the site and did some fun activities during the evening. *C'était une longue journée*!



On Tuesday, we explored a gorgeous local town, Brie-Comte-Robert, with its medieval castle, quaint cobbled streets and bustling market. Pupils completed a competitive town treasure trail (in French, of course!), while taking in all the sights and sounds and looking for clues in signs, statues and shops.



The most amazing part of the morning was shopping! Pupils practised their French conversational skills by purchasing ingredients for their lunch, and there was a race to see who could buy the biggest cream cake for pudding. We then returned to our base at CdGR and created masterpieces with what we'd bought, a little like a 'Ready, Steady, Cook' challenge. Needless to say, the competition was fierce, although "The A Team" won...but only just.

On Tuesday afternoon we explored a stunning castle, Vaux-le-Vicomte, the blueprint for the royal château at Versailles and the site of the 'The Man in the Iron Mask' legend. The weather was stunning, and we explored the vast formal gardens, taking in the fountains and statues, and including a long walk to the far end of the grounds to see the massive golden statue of Hercules on his horse. The beautiful views made the trek worthwhile.

Back to CdGR for dinner, followed by an amazing chance to make our own crêpes! *Délicieux!*



On Wednesday, we travelled into the centre of Paris and made the very most of our time there, despite the city centre being virtually gridlocked (due to a visit by King Charles).

Our first stop was the world-famous Louvre Museum. Our PGL rep Alex told us that if we'd stopped and looked at every piece of art for a single minute we'd have had to spend 65 days there! Unfortunately, we didn't have that long, so we had a quick dash to see priceless artefacts, such as 'The Winged Victory of Samothrace' and the 'Venus de Milo' statues, and of course Leonardo da Vinci's 'Mona Lisa'. The galleries were incredibly crowded, so it was a whistle-stop tour around the museum, although it was totally worth seeing world-famous artworks with our own eyes.



After the Louvre, we drove [slowly] through Paris to the Stade de France, the national sports stadium (so, the 'French Wembley'). We had a private tour, including visiting the players' changing rooms and the Presidential Suite, and we even ran down the tunnel towards the pitch. Our tour guide gave us fascinating facts along the way, such as the fact that the TV screens are as big as tennis courts – it's that impressive. What really made this part of the trip was that the stadium was geared up to host the Rugby World Cup (South Africa vs Ireland), so it was fascinating to see everything adorned in the countries' colours.

Our final visit on Wednesday was back towards the Eiffel Tower and to take a well-needed relaxing boat ride along the Seine on the 'Bateaux Parisiens'. The weather was still great, which gave us loads of opportunities to take fantastic photos of sites such as Notre Dame Cathedral and, of course, the Tower itself.



Back to CdGR, our evening meal – including *escargots* (snails)!!! – and a silent disco, which was as weird as it sounds.



Our final, full day in Paris was probably the highlight for most pupils, as we spent the whole day at Disneyland! We had an amazing time on all the rides (my ears are still ringing from Harvey Semons' screams, who was sitting next to me on Space Mountain) and we saw the parades and shows. Not to mention a shopping extravaganza! We were lucky to stay until the evening when we enjoyed the amazing fireworks and light show (complete with lasers and drones) - an unforgettable Despite some rain in the experience. morning, this was another fantastic day!





On Friday morning we packed our bags and made an early start, ready to travel back to Risedale. It was another long day and we definitely all needed a weekend to recover.

All in all, Paris 2023 was a massive success. Both our coach driver and our PGL rep said that Risedale were genuinely pupils among the best, most polite and most respectful had pupils they ever worked with, and it's true to say that all participating pupils represented our school incredibly.

Deputy Headteacher, Mr Yates, presented the awards alongside Lead Senior Pupil Ambassadors, Grace Baker and Archie Bassett.

Ahead of the awards, Mr Yates shared why events like this are an important part of school life at Risedale,

"This evening is not just about the pupils who have got the top grade, it's about looking at the pupils who have holistically worked hard or overcome adversity or a personal challenge and have achieved something that for them is outstanding.

Without celebrations like this, they are the ones who can often go unnoticed.

In doing this, we are trying to reward the silent majority of pupils who every day get it right, but don't always get the recognition they deserve."

The awards celebrate achievement across the curriculum with trophies for academic, sporting, and voluntary successes.

Amongst the attendees at the Presentation Evening were representatives from the Soroptimist Society who were there to see Ellie McGee awarded the Soroptimist Cup, an award that recognises pupils who volunteer or contribute towards school life.

As Pupil Ambassador, Ellie helped pupils adjust to school life at Risedale, an



important factor for the Garrison school where 70% of our pupil population have one or more parents in the Armed Forces and have often experienced disruption in their education.

Now at Queen Elizabeth College in Darlington, Ellie reflected on her time at Risedale School sharing that the things she misses the most are the teachers.

Rogan Glass, recipient of awards for both Maths and Most Improved Attitude to Learning, a fellow alumnus of Risedale School, echoed Ellie's words,

"I miss the relationships I have with the teachers, I looked forward to seeing them, particularly the History and German teachers.

They explained things well whilst still keeping it entertaining and they helped a lot with getting the grades I needed to go to college."



The impact of the teaching team at Risedale School was evident throughout the evening with many of the pupils attributing their success in their subject awards to their teachers.



Mollie Thirwell, recipient of multiple awards, animatedly shared how her Geography teacher Mr Ford helped her find a passion for Geography,

"I took the subject for GCSE, if you had told me in Year 7 that I would have, I don't think I would have believed you.

I didn't use to like Geography in primary and not even really in Year 7, but then I started warming up to it in Year 8 and then in Year 9 it got really good!"

Mollie continued that Mr Ford's creative approach to teaching the subject made it one of her favourites, something that extended beyond the classroom,

"I was doing learning outside of school because I liked the subject so much!"


Restart a Heart Day 🤎
