Riley

"Riley has been a service child all his life and sadly lost his mother in 2020. He was living with grandparents in Manchester but was then thrown into military life when he moved to the garrison with his Dad in spring 2023.

Since arriving and awaiting a school placement, he has volunteered his time helping local councillors, litter picking around the garrison and building planters for a Community allotment. He helps catterick garrison football club by refereeing younger children's matches at weekends. He is always on the lookout to see where he can commit his free time to helping others locally. He is an inspirational young person with a big heart and deserves recognition for his efforts."

"Riley has recently moved to Catterick to live with his Father and his family after sadly losing his Mother when he was 11. His Grandparents were no longer able to care for him so he left his home town and school to start a new life with his Military Dad, his Step Mum and 2 young siblings. One of whom has Autism and is non-verbal.

Whilst awaiting a school place Riley has thrown himself into helping others by litter picking, building veg planters and helping to transform Bramble Woods into an amazing community space. He is also a great support at home helping out with his siblings.

He has also passed his referee course and now referees younger children's matches at weekends. He has joined the local rugby club to make friends and plays regularly.



We have had a three year old litter picking before, very sweet. Bramble Woods is a 3.5 acre woodland and allotment site, which wouldn't be as fantastic as it is without volunteers from the local community. We are in the heart of Catterick Garrison and free to access 24/7.

The volunteers donate their time to the site, whether this be gardening or woodwork, or a seasonal event. We have created some great impacts in 2023, from children's mental health to teaching life cycles of living creatures, we are all inclusive.

What I really enjoy about our events is seeing grandparents spending precious time with their service grandchildren in tje fresh air and learning together. E50K facilitate, but it is a site and a company run by the community-for the community."



"Luke has been a leading member of our school stage crew for the last four years. Luke began working with the stage crew and was particularly interested in stage lighting and sound. He has been involved in every single production and performance event for the last four years at Bedale High School demonstrating complete commitment, professionalism and a real sense of resilience.

Last year we had a completely new sound and lighting system installed in our main hall. Luke was fully invested in learning how to operate this new system and attended a number of externally training events as well as independently giving up his own time to master the system. After he had worked hard to understand the system, he then gave up willingly yet more of his time to teach some of our younger students how to operate the new lighting desk and set up the stage lights.

Luke is a mature and polite young man. His steady, and consistent approach to his stage crew duties has made him a valuable member of our team. The younger students look up to him and have a huge amount of respect for his knowledge and his kind and compassionate approach to his stage crew technical duties."

Kacey

"Kacey's dad lives down in sandhurst (we are married unaccompanied) as a family we didn't move down as her brother TJ has complex needs and health needs TJ is 10, non verbal, has autism, is tube fed, still in nappies ect, he's settled at his school ect so we decided that instead of unsettling everything this would be best for our family. Kacey helps me so much with TJ, she always puts herself second, she will check her brother is OK, she will get me things that I need, she will contstaly ask if I'm OK and do I need a cup of tea. Shes so understating and so helpful when I need her. TJ loves his big sister so much. It can be very hard for kacey as TJ needs alot of my attention but kacey doesn't get upset or anything, she just smiles and gets on. TJ doesnt sleep well and this can affect everyone in the house, but kacey still goes to school and tries 100% every day. Kacey is learning makaton at home so she can sign with her brother, she is always telling people about him and his autsim, shes so caring to people who have disabilities because they are like her borther. I would love for her to get this special award so she knows how incredibly proud I always am of her and how caring she is, it matters she matters."

Service Children Friendly School of the Year



An award for a school that goes above and beyond in welcoming and supporting military families

Beckwithshaw

"I am a parent of 3 children who attend Beckwithshaw Primary School. I am a serving soldier and this is my 3rd move whilst in the Armed forces over 21 years. In October 23 my family and myself moved to Harrogate and we received a warm welcome from this school and they went above and beyond to make us feel comfortable knowing we would be leaving our children in their care.

Moving schools was very stressful for my children with my son age 5 and daughter aged 8, Beckwithshaw was fully capable of making them feel at ease very quickly and ensuring all their needs were met and fully understood the change they have just went through.

I was invited into the school to talk to the children about Remembrance Day, once again was made to feel very welcome.

Their continued support for my children when I'm away is the best I have ever seen.

These schools are highly recommended for recognition for Service children's friendly school of the year."

"Lyla has gone through so much with her health from such a young age and still continues to fight and get up everyday. Attending school. She is a true inspiration and truly deserves it."





"I would like to nominate Lyla for this award as she is the true definition of brave. She has battled with a brain tumor from a young age (3 years old) and had around 17 operations on her brain to date with another one due over Christmas.

I have worked closely with Lyla since she started Le-Cateau school, I have seen first hand how her illness affects her and how much pain this causes her.

She has always shown great bravery and resilience. Even at her worst times when she was extremely poorly in school, she would refuse to be sent home to rest and ask to continue with her school work. She always put others before herself and I have never heard her complain.

Her illness has not stopped her achieving anything she puts her mind too, she even fundraises for a charity she set up, which pays for a caravan that allows sick service children and their families have rest bite and make memories.

I have never met anyone quite like Lyla, she is not only brave and resilient, but also has qualities that we should all aspire too."

Month of the Military Child -The Big Virtual Assembly



I have loved seeing so many of you celebrating the Month of the Military Child at your schools this year. This year I offered you all the opportunity to access a free assembly presentation and many of you then shared that with your school communities. I have received some really lovely feedback that I wanted to share with you...

I just wanted to say thank you for the assembly that you shared. My Year 5/6 class watched it on Friday and were totally focused the whole time it was playing. They were excited to recognise you from when you came into our class in the Autumn term and especially loved the rap ... and the fact that two of them were seen in one of the pictures from Ripon Cathedrall It prompted a lot of discussion: particularly as the dad of one of my pupils is currently away. She clearly felt that her contribution was being recognised and enjoyed telling us more about her experiences and feelings. The rest of the class also felt that you were speaking to them - I think the contribution to the welfare of service children by those pupils who are their friends and classmates, and the difficulties of watching friends move on is sometimes overlooked, so it was lovely to hear their support being acknowledged.

Thank you for all your hard work in recognising, valuing and celebrating these children.

I hope that lots of you have found this a useful resource and I will continue to find as many ways as I can to engage with schools moving forward.

During April I visited 10 schools to deliver Art workshops. Lucy Pittaway, a successful commercial artist based here in North Yorkshire kindly supported the project by providing a print to inspire the children which was called 'Starting Again'. Lucy added some dandelions, the symbol of the military child and helped us to divide the picture into 100 squares. Over the two weeks children and young people recreated a section of the bigger picture on mini canvases using acrylic paints. They did not see the final picture at all so had no idea of what the final result would look like. I think you can agree that it is absolutely stunning. Lucy saw the final piece for the first time at the awards ceremony and also presented an award to our Creative Champion Luke.

We are hopeful that the painting will be on display over the coming months in various locations so that children and families can go and visit it, watch this space for further updates.
