




Dear parents/carers and pupils,

Pupils and staff from Risedale School enjoyed a glittering afternoon of celebrations at the Service Children Awards 2025, held at The Garden Rooms at Tennants in Leyburn on Thursday, 24th April. The event, expertly organised for its second year by dedicated Service Children's Champion, Angela Campbell, recognised the remarkable resilience, adaptability, and contributions of young individuals and supportive organisations within armed forces communities. The timing of the awards was particularly meaningful, falling within April, the designated 'Month of the Military Child' , a special time to acknowledge the sacrifices and celebrate the strength of children from military families.

Representing Risedale School at the awards ceremony were Headteacher Mrs Greenwood, staff members Dr. Ellis (Service Pupil Manager), Mrs Johnson (Service Children's Advocate), and Mr Morris (Administration Assistant), and pupils Emily-Faye Fort, Ria Glenn and Sienna Stevens (Service Pupil Ambassador).

The school, deeply rooted in the Catterick Garrison community, proudly supports a large number of pupils from service backgrounds and was itself nominated for the prestigious **"Service Children Friendly Education Provider"** award, highlighting its ongoing commitment to these pupils.

The event was particularly special as Risedale School celebrated multiple wins. Firstly, in a fantastic achievement, by sisters Lacey and Sienna-Jade Hanson, who were jointly awarded the title of "Service Children Sporting Champions". Unfortunately, the talented duo were unable to attend the ceremony as on the day they were in America,

representing both Risedale School and Lazer Cheer at the esteemed Allstar World Championship in Florida.

Adding to the accolades, the Service Children's Community Choir, with strong Risedale participation, was awarded the "Service Children's Friendly Community Group" title. Proudly collecting the award were Risedale pupils Emily-Faye Fort and Ria Glenn, accompanied by their Musical Director, Benjamin Noble, and two other junior members of the choir.



Furthermore, the school is delighted to announce that Mrs Johnson was the well-deserved winner of the prestigious "Service Children's Advocate of the Year" award! This accolade recognises Mrs Johnson's exceptional dedication and unwavering support for the service children within the school and wider community. We are so proud!

Year 11 Geography Field Trip

Bringing Geography to Life: Year 11's fieldwork experience in Hornsea, gaining real-world insights into coastal Geography

On Friday, 25th April, forty-three enthusiastic Year 11 GCSE Geography pupils ventured to Hornsea, a key location along the dynamic Holderness Coastline. This crucial field trip provided invaluable hands-on experience for their compulsory Geography Fieldwork component.

The morning saw our intrepid geographers actively engaged in data collection on Hornsea Beach. Focusing on coastal management strategies, the pupils meticulously measured groynes, gaining a practical understanding of their role in influencing sediment transport and coastal erosion.

In the afternoon, the focus shifted to Hornsea Town Centre, where pupils asked members of the public to answer questionnaires so they could gather data about the social and economic impacts of









tourism in the area. This experience also boosted their communication and interpersonal skills. The day also offered a chance to experience some of Hornsea's local flavour, with many pupils (and staff!) taking the opportunity to sample the traditional seaside treat of fish and chips.

"It was a truly rewarding day," commented Mr Sherwood, Head of Geography and the Humanities Faculty at Risedale.

"The pupils demonstrated excellent engagement and a real enthusiasm for their fieldwork. The success of this trip is a testament to their positive attitudes and the dedication of the staff who accompanied them, bringing key geographical concepts to life. Well done, everyone!"


After much deliberation, Mrs Greenwood selected three exceptional entries as winners:

Victory for Risedale Y10 Football Team 🚷



Risedale Roar to County Cup Plate Glory in Thrilling Final against Stokesley.

The County Cup Plate finale on Wednesday, 7th May, delivered a spectacle worthy of the occasion, a thrilling back-and-forth encounter played with immense mutual **RESPECT** between Risedale and Stokesley School & Sixth Form College. This display of sportsmanship, along with the team's performance, serves as an exemplary illustration of Risedale School's new **Vision and Values** in action.

Risedale frequently dictated the tempo, and this control allowed them to start brightly. The strong **RELATIONSHIPS** in midfield were evident as William Bell's audacious early attempt tested the Stokesley keeper. The initiative, which saw pupils engaging in weekly sessions, proved to be an overwhelming success, leaving a lasting positive impact on all involved. The Veterans

Community and Enterprise Centre shared their delight on Facebook, stating, "It was an absolute pleasure working with the students. They were well-behaved and all enthusiastic to learn new skills. They all had a great deal of talent and good imagination. The students also met members from Blind Veterans UK, who had a woodworking background, and those veterans showed that a disability does not stop you from having a go. The students were a credit to the school."

This sentiment was echoed by Risedale staff member, Mrs Deighton (HLTA), who organised and accompanied the pupils to the project each week. She enthusiastically reported: "Our pupils had a fantastic time learning new skills from Chris Morgan and his team at the Veterans Community and Enterprise Centre. Their weekly sessions were varied, engaging, productive and fun. Every pupil made a number of models, using scroll saws, hand carving and ultimately wood turning, a fantastic (and very useful) wooden pen. These pathfinders have ensured that there is now a superb programme in place for future groups."

The success of the Woodcraft Project is a testament to the collaborative spirit between Risedale School and external organisations. Mrs Deighton extended a heartfelt thank you to Kirk Lester from the Army Welfare Service (AWS), acknowledging their crucial role in making such enriching outside learning opportunities a reality for the pupils.

Risedale School has been awarded the prestigious **'School Mental Health Award'**, achieving the **'Silver'** standard as assessed by the Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools. This accolade recognises Risedale's outstanding commitment to the mental health and wellbeing of its pupils and staff.

Risedale School has implemented a comprehensive range of initiatives to foster a positive wellbeing culture. These include in-school support through Creative Arts, Art Therapy, the Thrive Approach, Emotion Coaching, and Mentoring. Crucially, it also offers the significant benefit of a full-time, on-site Counsellor for pupils and staff, setting it apart from other local schools that typically access counselling services externally.

Risedale School enhances its pupil wellbeing support through active engagement with external agencies, including the Garrison Assist Project, North Yorkshire Wellbeing in Sport, Young Carers, and local safeguarding providers. Recognising its strong ties with Catterick Garrison and a significant service family population, the school also has a dedicated Service Children's Manager and Advocate to provide specific support and guidance.

School Counsellor, Lisa Smith, commented: "I am so proud that we have achieved the Silver Award. It's a true reflection of the hard work and unwavering commitment of both staff and pupils in cultivating a whole-school approach to mental health and wellbeing at Risedale."

Through collaborative efforts, the school has successfully built upon existing good practices while continuously striving to develop even more effective strategies for mental health and wellbeing support.

A central element of Risedale's success has been its dedication to fostering a positive and supportive whole-school culture. The voices of pupils, staff, and parents are actively valued, creating an environment where pupils feel empowered to express any concerns about their mental health. The school boasts a strong cohort of Pupil Mental Health Ambassadors, Service Pupil Ambassadors, an active Pupil Council, and support for Young Carers. Furthermore, all pupils are encouraged to contribute ideas for promoting mental health through a dedicated wellbeing Google Classroom.

As a result of this proactive approach, pupils feel confident discussing mental health. The school actively promotes and shares its positive wellbeing initiatives through various channels, including local press, the school newsletter, website, and social media.

Headteacher, Mrs Greenwood, said: "At Risedale, we believe wholeheartedly that the key to unlocking learning and progress is happy pupils and staff, so we have worked hard to introduce and embed good wellbeing practices. Pupils are at the forefront of leading these - we listen to their thoughts and ideas around mental health and wellbeing and will continue to do so."

The award was established in 2017 by the Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools – part of Leeds Beckett University – and social enterprise Minds Ahead.

The Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools aims to strengthen pupils' mental health by supporting schools to make a positive change at all levels of the UK's education system, improving students' outcomes and life chances.

Rachel C. Boyle, Dean of Leeds Beckett's Carnegie School of Education, said: "The achievement of the Mental Health award is a demonstration of the school's significant commitment to improving children's and staff's mental health and wellbeing. It is also a commitment to developing practices in school that seek to improve awareness and expertise in creating safe and secure learning environments in which all children can truly fulfil their potential. This award is one that all staff can be truly proud of".

Nationally, more than 1400 schools have signed up to take part in the mental health award.

Dean Johnstone, founder and CEO of Minds Ahead, said: "This award shines a light on the excellent work schools are doing to promote mental health for their community of children and adults.


Risedale School Honoured for Exceptional Support to Children of Operation LAZURITE
