
Risedale Governor, Gary Morley, completes charity walk from Land's

End to John o'Groats

Gary Morley, a Governor at Risedale School, completed an impressive walk from Land's End to John o'Groats. He started his journey on Monday, 1st April and arrived at John o'Groats 61 days later, on Saturday, 1st June 2024. Gary covered a total distance of 1,240.1 miles during his walk and raised over £4000 for Prostate Cancer UK.

Gary said, "The idea of walking from Land's End to John o'Groats has been on my mind since 2009 and I loved the idea of exploring and seeing new places."

To prepare for his walk, Gary, an Army Veteran of the Gloucestershire regiment, sent parcels across



Along the way, Gary met other walkers, but the adventure was mainly a solo one. He camped in his one-man tent most of the time but also stayed in hostels and with friends along the route. His friends who offered him a place to stay would drop him back at his starting point the next day. During the walk, Gary only stayed at home in Darlington for 2 nights to rest, enjoy some home comforts, and buy a replacement pair of walking boots!













During his journey, Gary posted daily updates to his social media pages, sharing images of the beautiful scenery, changeable weather, and mileage updates. His love of coffee, cake, and the occasional pint of Guinness was also evident in the photos he posted.

Gary remarked, "Every morning, I posted a selfie and it was wonderful to receive everyone's messages of encouragement. It truly motivated me throughout the day,

and I enjoyed reading the comments. It felt like everyone was with me, supporting me along the way with their kind messages."

This isn't the first time Gary has travelled from Land's End to John o'Groats; in fact, it's his 5th time, which he completed between 2009 and 2015. However, all his previous Land's End to John o'Groats adventures were done by bike, often with the Hummersknott Cycle group which he led with fellow Risedale School colleague, Gary Lamont.

Upon reaching Scotland, Gary knew the finish line was in sight. He then set up and shared his JustGiving page to appeal for donations to Prostate Cancer UK.

Gary explained, "I chose not to set up the donation page at the start of the walk just in case I couldn't finish, and I didn't want to disappoint anyone. But the support I've received has been astonishing. I am so grateful!"



On 1st June, Gary arrived at John o'Groats where he was welcomed by his wife Emma and one of his daughters, Keziah, at the famous signpost landmark.

His proud wife Emma said, "It was great to be able to support Gary on those last few days. We are all extremely proud of everything he has achieved."

Gary received unwavering support from his army veteran friends, colleagues, and of course, his family: his wife Emma and daughters Keziah and Alice.

Year 10 Army Residential

In May, twenty-two Year 10 Risedale School pupils embarked on an action-packed adventure at Warcop Camp in Cumbria. This four-day



residential trip, part of the British Army Supporting Education (BASE) programme, saw them push their limits and develop valuable skills.

The BASE program isn't just about learning army drills. Risedale's participants gained a deeper understanding of the British Army's core values – discipline, integrity, loyalty, and courage. These values became the foundation for a series of challenges designed to build life skills and personal qualities.

Pupils learned practical skills like packing and carrying their kit with a Bergen (a military backpack), essential for any soldier on the move. They also tackled the art of survival, from pitching tents to applying camouflage and preparing meals with limited resources.

But the learning went beyond the basics. The trip incorporated problem-solving activities on the ranges, requiring teamwork and strategic thinking. They even faced a rigorous kit inspection, a chance to learn the importance of organisation and preparedness.

Here's what some of our pupils had to say about their Army residential trip::

Freya Carter (10Hill): "The trip was really fun and educational. At first, I was scared and thought the staff would be very strict, but as the days went on and we learned more, I realised the Army might be the place for me. The staff were so welcoming and took the time to get to know us as individuals. They even joined in with evening activities, and if you didn't understand something, they wouldn't single you out - they helped us one-on-one. They talked to us about how to join the Army and the benefits you could get. They also taught us all about the different aspects of Army life."



Ethan Watkins-Brown (10Ford): "I feel this trip gave me a good idea of what Army life is really like and helped me understand it better. Before the trip, I thought all the staff would be strict and the rules would be really strict too, but it wasn't like that at all. All the staff members were welcoming and listened whenever we needed something or wanted to ask questions. Whenever we did a new activity, they always gave us a demonstration so we could



understand it, like how to make your bed properly or put up a basher. They also talked to us about the benefits of being in the Army and how much support they give you. They even told us about all the different jobs you can do in the Army. I've always thought about joining the Army, and I think this trip has definitely made me consider going to Harrogate College and joining the military."

Kai-Leigh Paige (10Houlgate): "I think this residential trip definitely gave us all a good look at what Army life is really like. On the bus ride there, I was a bit scared the staff would be strict since they're in the Army, but they were so nice and welcoming to us all. During the evenings, we did some activities like watching movies and playing cards. They made sure everyone had a say and taught us many things, like how to make our beds properly and how to pack our Bergens. At the end of the trip, they also gave us a PowerPoint



presentation about all the different jobs we could do in the military. I think this trip made me want to join the Army even more, and I'm looking forward to joining the Army preparation college in Harrogate."

Poppy Levitt (10Ford): "This trip is something I would definitely do again! I already go to cadets, so I had an idea of what the residential would be like, and I knew I'd enjoy it right away. It was great to meet and spend time with other pupils I hadn't spoken to before, and we all got along well. I found the activities challenging, but not impossible. The staff were so friendly and not strict at all. We learned some important lessons on how to make



your bed properly and keep your uniform neat and presentable. The fieldcraft exercise was probably my favourite and most enjoyable part of the whole trip. Making a tent and sleeping area was fun. The weather was so hot, and I was so tired I had to take a nap during our break. Thankfully, we didn't have to sleep outside in the end, although I wouldn't have minded because it would have been a whole new experience I would've loved. Tuesday was my favourite day on the whole trip. Harrogate College sounded interesting to me, but I'd like to experience more Army life activities first or be in cadets for at least a year to get my first star before I think about going away for a long time."

DofE Bronze & Silver Expeditions

Our Duke of Edinburgh's Award pupils in Year 9 (Bronze) and Year 10 (Silver), embarked on a challenging but rewarding expedition weekend on the 15th-16th June.

After school on Friday 14th June, our Year 10 DofE group headed off to complete their practice expedition, (a requirement of the Silver Award), and set up camp under clear blue skies. Breezy conditions added an element of challenge when putting up the

tents, but the pupils were in fine spirits. On Saturday morning they set off for Fremington Edge to practise navigation skills, such as pacing, taking a compass bearing and map reading. They worked incredibly hard and their resilience shone through as they successfully navigated back to camp, albeit drenched!

For our Year 9 Bronze Award group, this was their first Risedale expedition. They departed on Saturday morning carrying everything they needed for the weekend in their packs. One of the requirements for each DofE expedition is that they should be entirely self-sufficient. They navigated from Richmond to Marrick, gaining confidence as they went on, via the notorious Hudswell Steps, towards Downholme and finally to their campsite. Fin Miller deserves a special shoutout for his exceptional navigation skills, but the entire group impressed with their team spirit, singing and positivity.

When they arrived at the campsite, the rain was torrential and wind speeds had increased, but they still managed to put up their tents and cook a meal on a camp stove. Living in Catterick, army ration packs were top of the menu! Fuelled by their campsite feast the pupils settled down for the night in their tents.









Sadly, the rain did not let up, it was impossible to stay dry, and the temperature had dropped unseasonably low. To make sure that everyone remained safe, we had to make the difficult decision to abandon the expedition and return to Catterick early.

We are incredibly proud of the determination and resilience displayed by all our Y9 and Y10 DofE participants. They are true heroes! Plans are underway to ensure Year 9 can complete their qualifying expedition, and Year 10 will have the opportunity to finish their practice before their assessment in July, hopefully with more sunshine on their side.

A big thank you goes out to Miss Burke, Mr Carter, Mr Cornforth and Mr Higham for dedicating their weekend to supporting these amazing pupils.

Catterick Historical Archive Brings History to Life for Year 8 Pupils



In an inspiring collaboration, the Catterick Historical Archive has been working closely with Risedale School to provide Year 8 pupils with a unique educational experience

through a series of outdoor history walks. These walks, designed to complement the curriculum, have focused on the historical significance of the old Catterick Camp Railway, which once ran parallel to the main road leading into Catterick Garrison.

The initiative, which takes learning outside the traditional classroom setting, aims to deepen pupils' understanding of local history and the role the railway played in shaping the region. As they strolled along the historic path, pupils were transported back in time, discovering how the railway served as a vital link during significant periods in Catterick's past.



During the walks, knowledgeable guides from the Catterick Historical Archive shared fascinating stories about the railway's construction, its operational years, and eventual decline. Pupils learned about the pivotal role the railway played in supporting the military operations of Catterick Garrison, especially during the two World Wars.

The interactive nature of these history walks allowed pupils to engage with their local heritage in a meaningful way. They explored various landmarks and remnants of the old railway, which sparked curiosity and encouraged them to ask insightful questions about their surroundings. This hands-on learning experience not only enriched their historical knowledge but also fostered a deeper appreciation for the community they live in.

Teachers at Risedale School have praised the partnership with the Catterick Historical Archive, noting that the outdoor history walks have significantly enhanced the pupils'

learning experience. By stepping outside the classroom, pupils have gained a tangible connection to the history they study, making the subject more engaging and relevant.

The walk concluded at Camp Centre Roundabout, followed by lunch at The Centenary Hub in Piave Lines. This break allowed them to reflect on their morning explorations before embarking on the next leg of their journey to the Locomotion Railway Museum in Shildon. At the museum, pupils further expanded their knowledge of railway history. After a presentation on the history of Catterick Garrison, pupils explored a diverse collection of locomotives and learned about the evolution of rail transport.

The success of these history walks highlights the importance of community involvement in education. The Catterick Historical Archive's dedication to preserving and sharing local history has provided Risedale School's Year 8 pupils with an unforgettable educational journey. As the partnership continues, both organisations look forward to exploring more aspects of Catterick's rich history, ensuring that future generations remain connected to their heritage.

A big thank you to Service Children's Champion, Angela Campbell, and her team for organising such a heartwarming and memorable day!













Cyanotype Workshop



Risedale School Pupils Embrace the Sun with Cyanotype Workshop

On Wednesday 26th June, a group of Risedale School pupils delved into the world of alternative photography with a cyanotype workshop. Led by Design & Technology teacher Mrs Vizor and visiting artist Elaine Vizor, the session offered a unique explore opportunity for the pupils to sunlight-powered artistic technique with a rich history dating back to the 1840s. Cyanotypes, also known as blueprints, were invented by Sir John Herschel as a way to reproduce scientific documents. This early photographic process uses light-sensitive iron salts to create distinctive blueprints.



The workshop began with Elaine introducing the cyanotype process to the pupils. They started by creating small cyanotypes on specialised photosensitive paper, familiarising themselves with the technique. As their confidence grew, they progressed to larger-scale projects, experimenting with textiles and even creating cyanotype designs on t-shirts.







Sunny skies proved to be a perfect partner for the workshop. Mrs Vizor remarked, "The pupils truly enjoyed the experience, and the cyanotypes they created were fantastic. The beautiful weather allowed us to use sunlight effectively to expose the cyanotypes, making the entire day a resounding success."

Elaine Vizor added to the positive atmosphere, commenting, "It was a fantastic afternoon working with the Risedale pupils. I normally work with adults, so to have the opportunity to share my knowledge with secondary school pupils was a brilliant experience."

She added, "Every pupil was engaged in the process. They were magnificent and a pleasure to work with. Their creativity shone through and their individuality was evident in the varied designs they produced. The workshop went very smoothly and too quickly. We covered a lot of ground and it was a joy to work with such an interested, motivated and appreciative group of young people. It was also incredibly rewarding to see my daughter, Mrs Vizor, in action, teaching and inspiring the next generation."








Getting a Taste for the Future: Y10 Pupils Visit Darlington College




Risedale. This is a true testament to the collaborative spirit


