On Thursday, 27th February, Risedale School's main hall was transformed into an interactive career marketplace as pupils explored a wide range of pathways at the annual Careers Fair. This event provided direct access to industry experts and further education establishments, encouraging pupils to ask questions and discover their potential.



Throughout the day, pupils broadened their horizons by engaging directly with representatives from Darlington College, Queen Elizabeth Sixth Form College, Askham Bryan College, Amey, The ASK Programme, CLC Group, Gestamp, iNPIPE Products, Martin Gray Football Academy, MPCT (Military Preparation College for Training), Purple Creative Studio, Tom Willoughby Ltd and the Armed Forces. They seized the opportunity to ask questions, gain valuable insights, and uncover a variety of post-16 opportunities.

This year's fair was designed to move beyond simply showcasing options, focusing instead on fostering genuine connections and sparking meaningful dialogue. Pupils were encouraged to ask questions specific to their interests and career aspirations, taking ownership of their exploration and gathering insightful information directly from representatives across the various educational and professional fields.

Risedale School pupils showcased their design and engineering skills at the 2025 Rotary Technology Tournament held on Tuesday, 4th March. The event, a collaborative effort between the Rotary Club of Northallerton and the 1st Close Support Battalion REME, presented a unique challenge: to design and build a mechanical car capable of travelling through a tunnel and effectively moving a pile of rubble.

Three teams from Risedale, comprised of pupils from Years 8 and 9, joined 43 teams from other local schools in this demanding competition. All three teams demonstrated remarkable resilience and creative problem-solving throughout the day. STEM encompasses the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics, and the tournament was designed to promote these critical subjects.

The pupils' dedication and hard work paid off, with one Risedale team, featuring Year 9 pupils Byron Dagnall, Thomas Remmer, Syaron Shrish, and Harley Waring, achieving a commendable third-place finish in the overall competition.




Year 7 Boys' Football 🚷

Rob McCartney, Associate and Architect, said: "Joshua-Jay really impressed us with how much he has researched the routes into architecture, gearing his GCSE options accordingly to ensure he has the right subjects to progress at A-level to apply for university. It has been refreshing to work with such a keen young student who has the confidence to ask questions and is eager to develop and find out more about how a design evolves and how a practice operates."

During his week with us, Joshua-Jay has been given case studies to work on, enabling him to try some of the different design software packages, which he quickly found his way around.

Joshua-Jay added: "The experience has shown me what a working practice actually looks and feels like, giving me a great insight into the different roles within architecture and the paths I could take.
