Year 8 Bewerley Park Residential

From 16th June to 20th June, forty-one Year 8 pupils embarked on an enriching five-day residential trip to Bewerley Park Outdoor Education Centre, which provided an invaluable context for the practical application and development of our school values.

All pupils demonstrated **RESPONSIBILITY** by following safety instructions diligently during all activities and being accountable for their actions and decisions, particularly in challenging and unfamiliar situations like caving or climbing.

Staff were very impressed with the way the whole group showed **RESPECT** for the environment, for the instructors and especially for their peers; encouraging one another, celebrating successes, and offering support during difficulties.

The outdoor environment inherently presented challenges that required pupils to develop significant **RESILIENCE**. This included overcoming physical exertion during mountain biking, persevering through initial discomfort or fear in caving or climbing, and bouncing back from minor setbacks or frustrations, such as falling off a paddleboard, and trying again.

The Bewerley Park residential was a powerful catalyst for strengthening and forming new **RELATIONSHIPS**. Great teamwork skills were developed noticeably during the course of the week. Activities like climbing, caving, and even the river walk demanded effective collaboration. Pupils learned that "**TEAM: Together Everyone Achieves More"** was not just a motto but a practical necessity. They supported each other, communicated effectively, and worked collectively towards common goals. Pupils relied on their peers for support and encouragement, especially in activities where belaying required immense trust.

All the staff on the trip agree that the week has brought out the very **BEST** in all pupils by broadening horizons and exposing them to new experiences and challenges they may not have encountered before. They have watched their confidence growing daily as they overcame fears, realised their potential and experienced the satisfaction that comes from pushing personal boundaries. We are incredibly proud of all our pupils, and while this has been the first residential visit of this type for many years, we hope that it won't be the last.

A Beacon of Determination: Trilingual Student's Remarkable Journey from The Gambia to Darlington College

A trilingual student has been hailed a 'beacon of determination' after leaving her home in Africa to study in the UK.

Fatoumatta Sisay attended a taster day at Darlington College after moving to North Yorkshire from The Gambia and fell in love with business studies.

The daughter of a British soldier, she has served with distinction and is well on her way to securing top grades in her Level 3 Extended Diploma in Business, an important step towards fulfilling her dream of running her own businesses one day.

The 18-year-old left her home in The Gambia in 2021 to join her father who was serving with the 4th Battalion, The Royal Regiment of Scotland, a light mechanised infantry battalion.

When they moved to Catterick Garrison, Fatoumatta attended Risedale School and visited several colleges before deciding on Darlington College.

"My dad came to the UK first and decided we should join him," said Fatoumatta, who speaks English, Wolof and Mandinka.

"I was excited to be living with my dad again full-time, but was sad to leave my friends and other family. It was a great opportunity to get a better education. I do get a bit homesick sometimes, but I also feel at home here, where I now have lots of friends.

"It was easier than I thought adapting. I'd seen the UK in the movies and expected to get bullied, but that never happened, and everyone at Risedale and Darlington College was so welcoming and supportive."

She said she had thoroughly enjoyed her Darlington College course and had been securing distinctions in her work.

Fatoumatta recently attended a two-week work experience placement in Malta with Zara clothing, as part of the Turing programme, and has now secured a place at Leeds Beckett in Leeds to study a degree in business management and finance, when she will become the first in her family to attend university.

"The dream is to run my own businesses," she said. "I'd like to run a fashion business with my cousin, Ida, who wants to be a designer. We'd specialise in African wear. I also love baking and cooking, so would be happy to run a bakery, and I might end up helping my sister Agie with an accountancy firm too."

Business and management lecturer Lee Smith said: "Fatoumatta is a beacon of determination and inspiration.

"She has faced and overcome the challenges of a new country, culture and language with quiet determination and extraordinary resilience, and her dedication to her studies has been nothing short of remarkable.

"Fatoumatta has shown an unwavering commitment to excellence. Her academic performance has developed, achieving consistent distinction-level grades, which are a testament to her tireless work ethic and growth mindset."

He said she caught the bus at 6:50am, arriving an hour early to college, ready and eager to learn. Her attendance stood at an exemplary 98 per cent, the highest in her class, and her "cheerful presence uplifts both peers and staff alike".

"Always smiling, always positive, she embodies the spirit of the college and creates an environment where fellow students feel motivated and valued," he said.

"Fatoumatta's dedication extends beyond the classroom. She undertook a demanding retail placement while observing Ramadan, and her strength, integrity and humility during this period were truly inspirational.

"Fatoumatta is more than a student; she is a role model, a trailblazer and a shining example of what can be achieved through perseverance, kindness, and belief in oneself."

Cyanotype Pride Workshop



For the second consecutive year, Risedale School pupils once again embraced the power of the sun in a captivating cyanotype workshop held on Wednesday, 25th June. This special session included pupils who were instrumental in supporting the school's Pride celebrations this June and those who consistently go above and beyond to care for others in the school community. Building on the success of last year's inaugural event, the workshop saw these pupils explore this fascinating alternative photography technique for the first time, led by Design & Technology Teacher Mrs Vizor and returning visiting artist Elaine Vizor.

The workshop introduced the historical roots of cyanotypes, also known as blueprints. This process, invented by Sir John Herschel in the 1840s, was originally used for reproducing scientific documents. This distinctive early photographic method utilises light-sensitive iron salts to create striking blue and white images.

"It was wonderful to see the group engage with the cyanotype process," Mrs Vizor commented. "Having my Mum, Elaine, return to guide them through this unique art form made it an even richer experience. The pupils really enjoyed themselves, and the cyanotypes they produced this year were truly impressive."

The session began with Elaine Vizor introducing the cyanotype process to the pupils. They started by creating small cyanotypes on specialised photosensitive paper, familiarising themselves with the technique. As their confidence grew, they progressed to larger-scale projects, experimenting with different materials and expanding on the techniques.

Elaine Vizor shared her enthusiasm for the group: "It was a fantastic experience working with the Risedale pupils. It's incredibly rewarding to see their enthusiasm for this art form, and their creativity shone through in the diverse range of designs they produced. We covered a lot of ground, and it was clear they were a highly engaged and motivated group of young people. It was also incredibly rewarding to see my daughter, Mrs Vizor, continuing to inspire the next generation through art and textiles, especially when recognising such positive contributions to the school community."

Year 8 Modern Work Experience Day

On Thursday, 26th June, Risedale School had its very first Year 8 Modern Work Experience Day. We were delighted to welcome staff from CLC Group, the Station Cinema Richmond, Purple Creative Studios, and NYBEP, who delivered and supported various pupil projects and activities.

Catterick Historical Archive Brings History to Life for Year 8 Pupils



During June and July, Year 8 pupils from Risedale School swapped classroom walls for the open skies of Catterick Garrison as they took part in a special series of outdoor history sessions, delivered by the Catterick Historical Archive. These engaging and immersive walks, themed around the old Catterick Camp Railway, brought local history to life, connecting pupils with the people and places of the past that shaped their community.

The field trip began at Colburn Business Park, formerly known as 60 Squadron, where pupils gathered around veteran and local historian Knile. He set the stage by explaining the strategic significance of the area during its formation and wartime. From there, the group made their way along the Memorial Walk, where they explored the stories of those who served at Catterick Garrison during both World War I and World War II.

Following the now-vanished track of the Catterick Camp Railway, a line once vital to the movement of troops and supplies during both World Wars, pupils were encouraged to imagine how the landscape would have looked over a century ago. As they walked along roads and footpaths that trace the original track, they identified visible remnants of the railway's presence: raised embankments, the curve of old cuttings, and the layout of the main road where they once ran alongside each other.

Pupils were provided with a specially designed map featuring historical photographs of what once stood in various locations. Seeing these images, of long-demolished buildings, military theatres, and steam trains crossing what are now busy roads, offered a powerful visual resource. It helped bring the past to life, allowing pupils to compare today's surroundings with the bustling wartime infrastructure that once dominated the area. From the worn stone walls of the former coal yard to the faint outlines where sidings and platforms once stood, the pupils experienced a tangible link to history, seeing for themselves how the modern environment still carries the imprint of its military railway past.

As the pupils continued toward Hildyard Row, better known locally as The White Shops, they met their next guide, veteran and historian Paula. Her insights into the area's history added another valuable layer of local heritage to the day.

The journey pressed on, with pupils tracing further remnants of the railway line and noting where embankments still remain. A stop at the Cambrai School car park revealed the former site of railway sidings and a coal yard, where the original coal yard walls still stand as silent witnesses to the past. Veteran and historian Peter shared his detailed knowledge of the site's historical significance.

One of the most poignant stops on the route was the raised embankment where the old Camp Station platform once stood, opposite the historic Sandy's Soldiers Home. The group then headed toward the fence line near the newly built Catterick Integrated Care Centre (CICC), behind Perron House. There, Knile recounted how the area had once served as a German Prisoner of War Camp during the First World War, a striking reminder of the layers of history beneath their feet.



The walk culminated above the Camp Centre roundabout, offering a panoramic view steeped in historical meaning. Pupils learned that today's Aldi store sits on the former site of a Post Office, and its car park was once part of Coronation Park. From this vantage point, Year 8s were shown the past locations of the Bus Station, BT Telephone Exchange, Morgue, Camp Fire Station, and even the rail line that once ran through the roundabout and up toward Piave Lines and supply stores.

Continuing the journey, from Camp Centre, the group travelled toward Catterick Racecourse. After crossing the field south of the River Swale, pupils came upon the old railway bridge that once supported trains as they crossed the river. At this historic site, pupils engaged with a series of pre-set questions designed by Head of History, Mr Houlgate.

The area is steeped in layered history. After crossing the bridge to the north side and descending the embankment steps, pupils gathered around an interpretive information

board. The bridge, now known as the Brompton-on-Swale Bridle Bridge, features three striking silhouetted figures: a First Century Roman legionary, a First World War private soldier, and a modern British infantryman, linking different eras of military service. Nearby, another board shared details of Roman Cataractonium, sparking discussion about the ancient history of the site.

The group then paused at the recently erected memorial to the tragic 1944 Catterick Bridge railway explosion, reflecting on the event and its local impact.



The field trip concluded with a visit to LOCOMOTION Railway Museum in Shildon. After lunch, pupils gathered for a presentation by Anne Hoops, the museum's Senior Explainer. This was followed by guided tours led by knowledgeable museum staff. Pupils were then given free time to visit the onsite cafe and souvenir shop, rounding off a day that brought together maps, old photos, memories, and meaningful moments from across centuries of military and transport history.

Throughout the field trip, pupils were not only able to learn from passionate and knowledgeable guides, but also to see first-hand the physical traces of history all around them. The outing was an enriching experience that brought local wartime and transport heritage vividly to life, promoting curiosity and appreciation for the past.

After his time at Risedale, Bishwadhan followed his passion for art by studying for a Foundation Diploma at Darlington's <u>Queen Elizabeth Sixth Form College</u> (2017-2018). He then went on to earn his BA in Fine Art from the <u>Slade School of Fine Art, UCL</u> (2018-2022), and is now graduating with a highly coveted Postgraduate Diploma from the <u>Royal Academy Schools</u> (2022-2025).

Bishwadhan's compelling body of work has already been showcased in numerous significant exhibitions, and he has won awards and been featured in noted art publications. Bishwadhan was born in Sunsari, Nepal, in 1999. His work is deeply personal and focuses on issues of immigration; his feelings of loss and the intricate confusion of adapting to a new home are central to his artistic practice. He meticulously delves into the complex relationships people can have with both their mother country and their settled country, exploring the continuous endeavour to forge a sense of belonging. Installations, sculpture and moving images are key mediums for Bishwadhan, driven by a profound desire to question and rectify popular modes of representation for British Asian communities in his art.

Bish's journey is a powerful testament to the transformative power of art education and unwavering personal dedication. His work offers a poignant examination of both personal and collective human experiences, solidifying his well-deserved place in the art world. We can't wait to see what will happen next for him!

Year 9 Pupils Join Jamie Oliver's World Record Cook-Along

Risedale School Pupils Join Jamie Oliver's World Record Attempt in Pasta Champions Culinary Challenge.

Risedale School's Year 9 pupils showcased their culinary prowess on Tuesday, 1st July, as they actively participated in celebrity chef Jamie Oliver's ambitious Guinness World Record attempt for the largest multi-venue cookery class. The event saw pupils from Risedale, already immersed in Oliver's "10 Skills Programme" within their Key Stage 3 curriculum, rise to the challenge, demonstrating essential cooking skills and a passion for fresh, homemade food.



Risedale School champions Jamie Oliver's philosophy, which advocates for widespread access to cooking education to combat reliance on convenience foods. As Jamie Oliver himself states, "Everyone should have the opportunity to learn to cook; without it, we become dependent on others to feed us, or on convenience foods to fuel us – neither of which is sustainable."

The record-breaking challenge, which involved participants and schools across the country (and potentially globally) simultaneously preparing a homemade pasta and tomato sauce dish, was a natural fit for Risedale's existing curriculum. The "10 Skills Programme" focuses on equipping pupils with practical cooking abilities, fostering independence in the kitchen, and encouraging them to share their culinary creations with friends and family.

Mrs Dovaston, Head of Food Technology at Risedale, expressed immense pride in her Year 9 pupils' performance. "I am very proud of the Year 9 pupils and their continued resilience in Food Technology lessons this year," she commented. "They worked very hard in the Pasta Champions Challenge, supporting each other to follow the method, making fresh pasta and tomato sauce, as part of this nationwide challenge. The pupils all enjoyed the experience, learning and developing new skills. They were proud and keen to eat the results at lunchtime!"







The event not only provided a thrilling opportunity for pupils to be part of a global record attempt but also reinforced the valuable life skills they are developing through their food technology lessons. Risedale School continues to demonstrate its commitment to empowering pupils with the knowledge and abilities to make healthy and sustainable food choices for their futures.

Year 10 Darlington College Taster Day

The immersive experience allowed pupils to take part in various activities and tour the facilities, offering valuable insight into the technical qualifications they can pursue after Year 11. This visit will directly support their college applications in October.

Geography Field Trips

Year 8: Catterick Town Centre Regeneration

Year 8 Geography pupils recently embarked on a hands-on exploration of urban regeneration, focusing on the significant £21 million Catterick Town Centre Regeneration Project.

During their geography lesson, pupils visited Shute Road to observe the project's progress first hand. They witnessed the demolition of derelict buildings and the emergence of brownfield sites, now ready for new construction.

To assess the regeneration's impact, pupils conducted an environmental quality survey directly on the site. This was complemented by two further surveys: one completed in the classroom using pre-demolition photographs, and another utilising architects' drawings to evaluate the proposed scheme. Pupils then plotted their results on radar diagrams, enabling them to draw conclusions on whether the Catterick Town Centre Regeneration project is likely to improve the environment of Shute Road and its surrounding areas.

Well done, Year 8! Your engagement and learning during the field trips were excellent. Experiences like this, learning outside the classroom, are incredibly valuable.

Year 7: Exploring Rivers at Colburn Beck

This half term, Year 7 geographers put their classroom knowledge of rivers into practice by embarking on an insightful field trip to Colburn Beck. This nearby natural setting, just a short walk from school, served as an ideal outdoor classroom to deepen their understanding of river processes.

During their field trip, pupils observed key hydrological concepts firsthand. They investigated

the differences between permeable surfaces and impermeable surfaces, and infiltration

and surface runoff, understanding their direct links to flooding. Furthermore, they closely examined the shape of the valley sides and the river channel itself, discussing the natural processes that influence these formations.

The trip also provided an excellent opportunity to study various flood prevention strategies, with pupils identifying different types of engineering, including both hard and soft methods. It was truly remarkable to discover just how much practical geography exists within walking distance of the school!





Day 4: Thursday 3rd July


Bringing the Characters – and the Plant – to Life




End-of-Year House System News from Mr Gunnell
