Teaching and learning routines



We're all trying our best to find a balance between the routines we had at school and how things are now that we're working and learning from home. This is a challenge that we are all facing - students, parents/carers and teachers. It's become apparent that we are all working at different times and in different ways, trying

to manage the distractions and responsibilities we have at home, compared to the structure and routine we were used to at school.

Last week, we asked our teaching staff to try and remember to assign work to students on Google Classroom during the normal school hours of the day. We're able to do this by using the schedule facility in Google Classroom, so hopefully now, even if a teacher is setting work in the evening, the student won't be notified until the next day. Likewise, we ask students to try and send messages/questions to teachers about their work



during the school day. We have contacted Google about changing the times that they send notifications. Unfortunately this is not possible but it is possible to turn off



notifications on individual devices and to set a bedtime mode so you aren't disturbed at unsocial times. Hopefully this will help us all to establish a clear distinction between work and relaxation time - something that many of us are finding difficult to partition when working and learning from home .

Students don't have to follow a strict timetable but, to cope with school closure, it might be useful to have some sort of plan in place. Here's how:

- At school, we have 6 x 50 minute lessons a day = 5 hours of learning. Work out a timetable for you and try to stick to it as far as possible so you can achieve your full 25 hours learning a week.
- Give extra time to subjects that you know require additional attention.
- Schedule 15-minute breaks every hour or hour-and-a-half.
- Work hard and then allocate time to get away from your desk/computer to exercise and relax (this will ensure that you don't feel guilty when doing so).
- **Do not procrastinate.** We said to our Y10s in 'Keep in Touch' Issue 3 'The secret of getting ahead is getting started' Mark Twain.
- What if you get stuck? Do at home what we encourage at school. Brain, book, buddy, boss. Find the answer for yourself by THINKING, RESEARCHING, MESSAGING A FRIEND and only then ASKING YOUR PARENTS or CONTACTING YOUR TEACHER. Learning is all about finding solutions to problems and 'GETTING STUCK' is all part of the process.

Crafty Corner with Mrs Plews

Feeling a bit bored and in need of something creative to do?

Here's an idea... have a go at creating your own piece of abstract artwork.




Here are the things you will need: plain paper, scissors, masking tape (the cream tape that's kept in the messy drawer with other random things), felt tip pens, pencil crayons, pastels or paint ie. something to add colour with.



And here's how to do it:

- 1. Start with an A5 size piece of paper. If you don't have any A5, fold an A4 sheet in half and cut it into two.
- 2. Cut out lengths of masking tape and overlap across the paper, forming a pattern.
- 3. Now in the 'negative spaces' you have created ie. the spaces in between, blend or block in colours. Don't worry if you go onto the masking tape, you are meant to do this as it gives a nice edge to your shapes.
- 4. Experiment with shades of one colour or a rainbow of colours your choice. You could even fill the negative spaces with patterns.
- 5. Now the big moment peel off the masking tape to reveal your abstract masterpiece.
