Sporting Champion




A Service child who has excelled in sport whilst based in North Yorkshire

Approximately 5 weeks into an Operation I was notified that my wife, Sarah, had injured herself, losing all the feeling in her left leg and sever back and hip pain and being unable to do basic day to day tasks never mind running around after a toddler and facilitating the basic needs of the other children. With no family to assist without hesitation Kelsey stepped into mini mummy mode. Kelsey has been making all meals for the household, and all the housework that her mummy usually does, or I would do if I was home, making the packed lunches for school for her siblings. Kelsey has taken the responsibility of lifting her 2-year-old sister out of bed in the morning and putting her back into bed for each sleep and managing her safety. She has had to assist her mummy getting dressed and undressed in the morning and evenings along with helping her up and down the stairs.

They are welcomed to school and each provided with a brick that they decorate in the quad to give them a sense of belonging, even long after they have gone. Children feel welcomed and loved from the minute they arrive.

Stacey Johnson

Stacey has worked with Service students for many years while also coming from a Military Family herself so can relate to the young people. Stacey acts as a safe and approachable member of staff for all students and enables these service student to have access to support while carers are on deployment, activities and links to the outside Military community.

Stacey has created a detailed and welcoming wall display for service children at the entrance of Risedale School. She welcomes every new service child personally to Risedale and makes sure they have a buddy to help them settle in. She checks in with them on a regular basis to make sure they are settling in well. She takes time to listen to them and will always find the answers to any questions they might ask.

Stacey understands the challenges moving around a lot can bring to a service family and also recognises the needs of the civilian children who don't move often. Civilian children's friends move on a regular basis and then they are expected to make new friends often as the service children come and go. Stacey ensures the new arrivals integrate quickly.

Stacey gives her everything to the Service children at Risedale she is always talking about how she can improve their support at school. She has so many ideas for the future and is so excited to get them in place

Inspirational Service Child of the Year



An award to recognise the outstanding bravery of a Service child

Finlay

In 2017 Finlay's brother Rowan was born. It was obvious early on that Rowan was not a well child. He had some serious issues and was in a wheelchair as a result. In 2023, Rowan died from a growth in his brain. Finlay has shown. Thing but outstanding bravery. He travelled to hospitals to see Rowan no matter where they were and spent weeks apart from his mum and brother. He helped care for Rowan when he was at home. When Rowan died, Finlay made the decision to see Rowan and even spoke at his funeral.

Finlay has never let this have a negative impact on his life, he is kind, caring and brave. He constantly tries to do the right thing and talks about his brother helping to break the taboo of child death. Sadly, Finlay's sister also died in 2016 and although he was much younger then he continues to talk about her. In 2024, Finlay was diagnosed with epilepsy and a brain injury. Instead of letting it get him down, he speaks openly about it and encourages others to do the same. He constantly refuses to allow the things that have happened to him define him and strives to live every day. Although the brain injury means every day things like riding a bike and using cutlery etc are difficult for him he still refuses to allow it to beat him.







Seeds of Love Art Day 2025

What an incredible day this was! We held the Seeds of Love Art Day at Risedale School on Tuesday 8th April and welcomed almost 100 children. Thanks to funding provided by FEAST and support from PT Childcare we were able to allocate a large number of places to FSM pupils. Locality funding from Cllr Duckett, Cllr Windass, Cllr Hugill and Cllr Baker enabled the production of 100 resin hearts for the project which the children then, inspired by words from Mackenzie Thorpe who attended the event, set about painting and decorating their heart. The children also had access to drama, music and youth voice activities and it was such a positive day. Mackenzie Thorpe is kindly donated the child figure who will feature in our collaborative sculpture and Military Craftmanship CIC are also donating their time to helping with the installation and ensuring a high-quality finish. This is a real community effort and I am very much looking forward to seeing the finished piece in situ next year!





I am so pleased to see so many school communities have celebrated 'Purple Up' day this year. I visited Cambrai Primary School and must admit I was really moved when I saw them all dressed in purple and so clearly proud of their connection to the military community.
