for theirs.

Both teams have worked hard and been equally successful. LCpl Markham won the RAC Nordic Skiing Championship, winning every race in which he competed. His form looks good as he competes at the divisional and Army level this January. Meanwhile Lt Wallington won the Alpine RAC championship and placed



second in the division. He looks set to compete for the Army.

Late November saw the first time the Regiment had paraded as one in 18 months and welcomed home C Squadron with a homecoming parade, attended by the Lord Lieutenant of North Yorkshire. Sadly, this doubled as a farewell parade to D Squadron who have been resubordinated under the Future Soldier reforms.

Members of the Regiment also travelled to Sandringham to follow-through on a pledge to plant 1000 oak-saplings to commemorate the late Queen Elizabeth II's 75 years as Colonel-in-Chief. We were honoured that our new Colonel-in-Chief, Queen Camilla, attended to meet members of the Regiment and plant the first saplings.

On the cross-country course, Capt Free and Capt McDermott won the men's and women's RAC cross-country races respectively. LCpl Simmonds came a close second in the women's category.

The Lancers have an exciting year ahead and look forward to operations and conversion onto the AJAX armoured fighting vehicle platform.

3 AEC GROUP OP TEAMWORK VISIT TO THE ROYAL ARMOURIES

t the end of 2023, the Officers and Civil servants of 3 AEC group (based out of Vimy Barracks and responsible for education services in Catterick Garrison and its surrounding areas) were fortunate enough to visit the Royal Armouries in Leeds. This was part of an ongoing series of team cohesion events in-line with our commitment to the Defence-wide Op Teamwork initiative. It was a wonderful opportunity to learn a little bit more about some fascinating history, while also spending time together as a sub-unit.

Upon arrival in Leeds, we split into two groups, mixing the teams so that everyone was able to spend time with people they may not see often in the office environment. We then took turns to explore both the National Firearms Centre (NFC) and the Royal Armouries Museum. Getting a glimpse of the former was a particular treat, as it can be difficult to access the NFC collections which are held under particularly strict security conditions (as can only be expected from a site holding several thousands of weapons!).

Once we navigated through the NFC's unmarked doors and airport-style security scanners, we were treated to a fascinating tour of the collection by one of the expert curators. The NFC collection is believed

to be one of the most extensive and diverse of its type in the world, with weapons spanning hundreds of years from the oldest early muskets through to modern-day military and civil firearms. Highlights include James-bond style pens, umbrellas and canes with built-in firearms; the weapons seen in the Sharpe series; a prototype WWII rifle designed for shooting round corners; and Winston Churchill's own engraved Sterling submachine gun.

After this, we moved onto a workshop and further activities in the Royal Armouries Museum, which houses 6000 objects across five galleries. A must-see for visitors is the very impressive 'Hall of Steel', a giant staircase which has 2,500 objects arranged on the walls (including hundreds of decoratively arranged bayonets) and towers above those exploring the collection. We were treated to a talk on medieval armour by 3AEC's BSDM Andy Harriss, and of course, we took this opportunity to dress up in chainmail!

We then spent some time in small groups reflecting on how we can best work together as an effective team, discussing themes such as respect, empowerment, and inclusiveness and how these can be instilled in the workplace. We utilised the World Café method of holding dialogue in small groups in a 'coffee shop' atmosphere, and this allowed our conversations to be more collaborative, open and honest than might otherwise be facilitated

in a formal workplace. Several of the insights that emerged from these discussions are being carried forwards into new initiatives designed to bring the sub-unit closer together. We were able to examine some of our strengths and weaknesses as a sub-unit, and interrogate them with a Whole Force approach, incorporating both military and civil service perspectives.

We concluded the day with some time exploring the museum; one showstopper was the armour that belonged to a young King Henry VIII in his jousting days, when he still cut a trim figure!

The visit provided a brilliant opportunity for us to learn more about the UK's defence history in greater depth. Perhaps even more valuable, was the opportunity it presented to come together as a team. Taking some time to socialise in an entirely non-work environment inspired new conversations and ideas amongst the team, and allowed us to pause and refresh before jumping back into the busy tempo of military education services. One team member from the civil service stressed how important it was to feel included in these sub-unit social events. The discussions provided a useful moment to explore how we can best work with and support each other to the benefit of the education centre, and the wider Defence community. Huge thanks go to 3AEC IERO Bob Dixon for organising the visit.


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HACKFORTH AND HORNBY C OF E PRIMARY SCHOOL




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THE BEACON CHRISTMAS APPEAL 2023

A lot of the veterans arrive in Catterick with only the clothes on their backs and have all been homeless at one time or another. Without the kindness and thoughtfulness of local people around them, they would go without a lot of things. The Armed Forces donate food and non-alcoholic beverages, pasta, tins of food, and often donate cash so that we can use it to purchase necessary things. There are also donations from the local shops and two pensioner's buy groceries every month and donate their purchases to the guys without fail. Thank you".

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

Primary school in Richmond celebrates good Ofsted report

The headteacher has spoken of her pride and delight after Ofsted graded her school good overall and good in all areas.

Inspectors who visited St Mary's Catholic Primary School in Richmond found a "caring community" where children have everything they need to flourish.

The report added: "Pupils behave well and feel safe. They are well cared for by the adults, who know them well. When pupils join the school, they quickly become part of a caring community.

"Leaders have high expectations for pupils' achievement. This starts in the early years, where the curriculum has been well thought through to support pupils to learn. By the end of key stage 2, pupils have the skills that help them to be ready to move to secondary education.

Headteacher Fran Mackle said she couldn't be prouder of St Mary's children, families and governors.

"We are truly blessed to be part of such a wonderful community," she said. "I admire every member of my staff team as they always, without fail, put the children at the centre of everything they do.

"It's a real pleasure to work alongside such dedicated, motivated and highly skilled people. Our parents



and governors are a great support and the school wouldn't be the wonderful place it is without them.

"One of my main aims is to establish a healthy workplace culture where the emotional health and wellbeing of staff is recognised and valued. Mental health and wellbeing of both the staff and children alike is a key priority in everyday life at St Mary's.

"We are very proud of our new curriculum and the high expectations we all have for our children.

"We have a wonderful parish priest, Father John Bane, who fully embraces school life.

"We're also very lucky to be the feeder school to the Ofsted outstanding St Francis Xavier School in

Richmond, with our children gaining top category places in the admission process."

St Mary's, which is in Cross Lane, became part of Nicholas Postgate Catholic Academy Trust (NPCAT) in September 2022.

One of the country's largest Catholic multiacademy trusts, NPCAT is made up of 38 schools throughout Teesside and North Yorkshire, including the city of York.

CEO Hugh Hegarty further endorsed the leadership of Miss Mackle and her team.

"The support from the parish and community is a key strength of this beautiful school," he said.

"St Mary's and its sister school on the same site, SFX, afford parents the option for a seamless transition from primary into an outstanding secondary school.

"These pathways are so important and having them in Richmond is why places at St Mary's are so sought after."

Inspectors found some areas for improvement.

The report stated: "Some targets for pupils with SEND do not specify the precise knowledge or skills that are to be developed. This means that some small steps in learning are missed, and pupils find learning difficult.

"Some assessment processes are still being developed. This means that gaps in learning are not always being identified quickly. Leaders need to ensure that assessment criteria is closely matched to the curriculum and that staff regularly and effectively assess pupils' understanding."

Miss Mackle added: "My professional aspiration has always been to secure excellent outcomes for all children. To achieve this, a key priority is to focus on developing high-quality teaching and learning, ensuring all children receive the education they deserve.



"I will remain focused on what matters most. For me, that must be the children whose parents entrust them into our care."

e are so lucky to have built up a professional relationship with Cummins Engineering Darlington. On several occasions they have come to help us with landscaping the land around the Fold. 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
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

Time -It reminds that time is critical. God works in God's good time. The Easter story is the fulcrum


around which life revolves. There is a time for everything. It is a reminder to use our time wisely and to keep seeking after God and his goodness in our time.
